Course Title: Topics in Interpreter Education: Introduction to Oral Transliteration I

Course Description: Studies roles, responsibilities, and qualifications involved in working as an oral transliterator. Addresses specific linguistic and communication concerns typically occurring in the oral transliteration setting. May be repeated for credit. Prerequisite: Placement in ENG 111. Lecture 1 hour per week.

General Course Purpose: To introduce ASL-English interpretation students to the methods and practice of oral transliteration.

Course Prerequisites and Co-requisites:

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completing the course, the student will be able to:

- a. Identify and describe the qualification required to work as an oral transliterator;
- b. Identify and outline the findings of at least two instances of research regarding topics/issues concerning the oral transliteration setting; and
- c. Convey the specific linguistic, communication, and ethical concerns associated with working in the oral transliteration setting.

Major Topics to Be Included:

- a. Identification of role and responsibility when providing oral transliteration
- b. Identification of qualification required to work as an oral transliterator
- c. Literature pertaining to oral transliteration
- d. Specific linguistic and communication concerns typically occurring in the oral transliteration setting
- e. Specific ethical concerns when working as an oral transliterator

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
